Workshop Two Schedule

Learn how to progress students beyond individual Steps to writing complete texts using all of the Seven Steps techniques.



Session One: Think First, Write Second

Dive deeper into Step 1: Plan for Success to learn how to make planning easier for students.

- Patterns in writing Look at the similarities between different text types and how some texts contain elements of all three text types.
- **Persuasive brainstorming** Learn how to tackle an open-ended persuasive topic and put it into practice by brainstorming ideas.
- **Informative brainstorming** Discover how to deepen students' thinking on an informative topic by brainstorming research questions and narrowing the focus.

Session Two: Ready, Set, Write

Use all the Seven Steps to plan and write a complete text. Then learn how to move students from writing collaboratively to writing solo.

- Planning and drafting Work in groups to plan and write a complete informative text.
- **Going solo** Learn how to gradually reduce the scaffolds until students are writing solo.
- Narrative writing Discover how this collaborative writing approach applies to narrative texts.

Session Three: Feedback for Impact

Use the Seven Steps to provide explicit feedback to improve and finesse a text.

- **Explicit feedback** See which Steps are most relevant when providing explicit feedback on structure and expression to help students revise and improve their work. Put it into practice by providing feedback on a student writing sample.
- Gradual release Learn how to develop students' ability to peer-assess and then self-assess their work.
